While on retreat two weeks ago I bought a book 'The Art of Dying and Living' by Kerry Walters. He writes "Many of us die badly not because we are wicked or bad people but because we simply haven't been taught how to die well." He suggests that we need to cultivate the

virtues during our life. Doing this not only helps us cope with dying, it also makes our experience of dying a rich opportunity for learning some final truths about life and ourselves. Each chapter of the book is devoted to a well known contemporary Christian who shows us how virtue helped their living and dying. Among them was Pope John Paul and Cardinal Joseph Bernadine. If I was writing a similar book I would add Michael Evans, Bishop and dear friend.

On Wednesday I was at the Norwich Catholic Cathedral for his funeral. Attended by over two thousand people it was a moving and sad occasion yet filled with the expectant hope of eternal life. Michael and I started our training for the priesthood together in September 1969. There we became firm friends. Soon after he became bishop in 2003 he was diagnosed with prostate cancer and at Christmas last year was told he only had a few weeks to live. Then Michael said, "As I live now under the shadow of death, my prayer is very much that of St Paul, that I may know something of the power of Christ's resurrection and a share in his sufferings".

Unlike myself he was the most organised of men. God gave him more than two weeks in which to prepare for that final journey. I saw him immediately after Christmas and then our ordination year met with him last month overnight to celebrate Mass and have a meal together. It was the 36th anniversary of his ordination. We reminisced, shared stories, and left the next day knowing this was the last

time we would see him alive. When he knew he had only a short time to live his wish was to carry on the work of a bishop till the end of his life. In the last weeks of his life I believe he learnt how to let others help him and care for him. For so many years as a priest and bishop he was the one who did the caring and shepherding. As bishop he loved his calling to teach and he taught me by his life, especially in the last months, to completely put your trust in God. He had a great

love for C.S. Lewis and the Story of Narnia. Many years ago he asked me to draw Aslan and the picture still hangs on the wall of his living room. He was fond of quoting the last lines of the final book "The Last Battle":-

"And for us this is the end of all stories, and we can most truly say that they lived happily ever after. But for them it was only the beginning of the real story. All their life in this world and all their adventures in Narnia had only been the cover and the title page: now at last they were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read: which goes on for ever: in which every chapter is better than the one before."

Michael has begun his great adventure for which he has been preparing for the last fifty nine years.

SURVIVE-MIVA

(UK Registered Charity No. 268745)



is a Catholic lay Association which provides grants to fund essential transport for priests and religious bringing health care and pastoral support to remote communities in under-developed countries across Africa, Asia and Latin America.

Last year (2010) they supplied 219 modes of transport to 8 countries. This total was comprised of: 16 community health outreach vehicles; 29 motorbikes; 2 outboard motors; 1 boat plus outboard motor; 1 auto-rickshaw; 140 bicycles; and 30 mules (for catechists in Ethiopia).

One of the vehicle grants made in 2010 was for £3,000; it was used to buy a motorbike for a parish priest in Uganda serving 20 sub-stations. Also, a grant of £8,100 bought a jeep to act as a mobile clinic/ambulance for the Daughters of the Cross congregation who have a dispensary and 10-bed mini-hospital at Phalsa Mission, Orissa State, India. The Sisters serve 20 villages in a locality where public transport is poor and the nearest large hospital is 25 miles away.

The New Translation -Why do we need one?

As we have already seen, until the early 1960s, Mass was celebrated in Latin throughout the world. At the Second Vatican Council it was agreed that the Mass could be celebrated in our own language, and in 1970 Pope Paul VI agreed the official Latin text that would be used. This was then translated into different languages to be used throughout the world. It proved to be a huge task which was completed in a very short time. However, because it was done so quickly, some of the richness of the original Latin prayers was, quite literally, 'lost in translation'. It was seen that a further translation was needed. The new translation would keep the original words, meaning and style of the Latin as far as possible. The new translation also means a new edition of the Missal which will include some additional text such as, prayers for the saints who have been added by the Church to the liturgical calendar.
