I was a scout for a short time before I went away to school. Our motto was "be prepared"

In the Scouting Handbook Barden Powell explained what he meant by this. "Be prepared in mind by having disciplined yourself to be obedient to every order, and also by having thought out beforehand any accident or situation that might occur, so that you know the right thing to do at the right moment, and are willing to do it.

Be prepared in body by making yourself strong and

active and able to do the right thing at the right moment, and do it. "

The cry of John the Baptist is a little different. We are asked to prepare for the Lord and get ready for the coming of Christ as Saviour. This is an encouragement for us to think about how we prepare for Christmas time. This is our spiritual preparation. Depending on our approach to Christmas, we have our lists of things to do and we also will find that there seems to be an increasing number of events that we are asked to participate in, such as children's Christmas

productions, carol concerts, office parties, staff lunches or dinners. Then there are those annual Christmas activities of writing cards and buying presents. But what of our spiritual preparation?

Here are some simple suggestions. Sorry it is another list!

A. Go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Confession a great sacrament to healing. It enables us to open our hearts to Christ present in our lives. Times are published to the Christmas leaflet this week

B. Use the advent wreath as the centre piece of your family table.

It is not always easy to pray together as a family. The advent wreath can be a great focus. We can say a prayer as we light a candle before our family meal.

C. Use the Advent booklet "Living Word"


Today is Bible Sunday when we affirm the importance of the Word of God in our lives and our

relationship with God. The Living Word gives a reflection each day on the readings of the Day. You can also buy a copy of "Bible Alive" which comes out monthly and is a similar publication. There are other Advent booklets in the Repository which is open on Sunday mornings after Mass.

D. Take a copy of Wednesday Word from the church.

The children at Our Lady Immaculate School receive this each week. An adult version is available at the

back of the church and helps us reflect and pray on the following Sunday's gospel.



Perhaps give to Crisis which provides shelter, food and clothing for those who are homeless at Christmas. Their website is http://www.crisis.org.uk

On Christmas Day we might want to volunteer to help with the Christmas meal being provided for those who might be on their own. Details are on a poster at the

back of the church.

F. Consider giving some time to visit someone living on their own.

That person may be a neighbour or a relative. We value our time and giving something that we value to another willingly is a real gift.

G. Pray for the people of Bethlehem.

It has now become surrounded by the security wall and it is difficult for people to earn a living because of the severe restrictions on movement. Remember especially the Christian minority that live there.

H. Sit silently for five minutes each day.

In the silence we invite God to speak to our heart. We could say the Advent word, "Maranatha" to ourselves which means "Come Lord Jesus"

Enjoy the Christian season which ends on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which this year we celebrate on 13th January.

LENTEN PROJECT

On Sunday 25th November at the AGM there were 12 nominations for the Lenten Project in 2013.

Those present heard a summary of the work each charity undertook in various countries before voting for 4 projects to support next year. It was a very difficult decision as all the nominations were worthy of support and are doing such important work under often very difficult circumstances. The charities chosen are:

Friends of the Holy Land: This project deals directly with 3 parishes in the Bethlehem area.

The three Parish Priests meet to distribute food and clothing vouchers, blankets, heaters and

medicines. The vouchers are "spent" at shops owned by local Christians. The Priests ensure that only the most needy receive support.

Emmanuel International: This project in Tanzania is providing expertise and engineers to provide a clean water supply to a Secondary School in Furahia. The local community provide the labour etc. At present their supply comes from a sand river bed some distance away and is both unsafe and unhygienic.

Asha Ashram: The CMI missionaries provide shelter for those physically and mentally challenged tribal people of the Jagdalpur area of Chattisgarh State in India who are often abandoned on the street. At the shelter they receive food, treatment, education & training.

Loreto Day School Calcutta: Sr Cyril, who founded the school enlists the help of older children (aged 10 to 12 years) to scout their neighbourhoods and discover where younger children are working. These very young children are growing up in factories and shops deprived of the most basic rights of food, medical care and sleep. The owners are then persuaded to release the children for a few hours to attend the school to receive that care. The hope is that these children will gain some education/training to help themselves out of their predicament.

Peace in the Holy Land - Bishops write to the Foreign Secretary Rt Hon William Hague.

In the light of recent happenings in Israel / Palestine and Gaza two senior bishops, one Anglican and one Catholic, have written a public letter to Foreign Secretary William Hague urging fresh thinking about Israel-Palestine. The Rt Rev Michael Langrish, Bishop of Exeter and the Church of England's lead bishop on international affairs, and the Rt Rev Declan Lang, Bishop of Clifton and chair of the department for International affairs for the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, describe the UK government's recent decision to abstain from supporting the Palestinian bid for non-member observer state status at the United Nations as "regrettable".

They write: "the Palestinian bid to upgrade its status at the UN represented a legitimate and creative non-violent attempt at breaking the current political impasse. As such, it deserved wide support." The letter, in full, reads as follows:

To: Rt Hon William Hague MP Dear Foreign Secretary

The UK Government's regrettable decision to abstain from supporting the Palestinian bid for non-member observer state status puts into stark relief the broader problems facing the peoples of the Holy Land and the stalled political process that is supposed to bring them peace, an issue which remains of fundamental importance to the region whatever the new pressures of the 'Arab Spring'.

Indeed supporting those seeking dignity and democracy in the Arab world inevitably re-focuses attention on the failure to resolve the Palestinian issue. The traditional structure of the long sought-after resolution of that issue has long been regarded as the two state solution, as the only way to meet the national aspirations of the two peoples involved. The viability of that approach is now coming under increasing pressure, not least from relentless settlement building in the occupied territories which will soon render a contiguous Palestinian state unviable. That would be a tragedy for Palestinians and Israelis alike, since whatever the difficulties of establishing two states there do not seem to be any valid alternatives other than continuing conflict. Against this background the Palestinian bid to upgrade its status at the UN represented a legitimate and creative non-violent attempt at breaking the current political impasse. As such, it deserved wide support.

This conflict has gone on too long, and its continuing human cost is clear, not only in the recent sad loss of life on both sides during the recent Gaza-related violence, but in terms of the insidious burden the current situation places upon both occupied and occupier, and in the loss of potential, especially amongst young people. These are the poisoned fruits of a political stalemate. Merely seeking to manage this frustrating stalemate and to contain the inevitable fallout is no longer a viable strategy and will if persisted with, only result in additional human suffering.

What can be done? The resource of faith, above all the common monotheistic ethic of reverence for life, does provide hope and religious leaders from all communities are working to build bridges of understanding. That slow, difficult work deserves greater support and recognition, not least from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. Such efforts can serve as a way of refocusing attention back to the key struggle - the need to respect the civil, religious and political rights of all those - Jew, Christian, Muslim, Arab and Israeli - caught in the conflict.

The strong have a particular obligation and Israelis needs to be true to their ethical tradition. But all parties must refocus on respecting the sanctity of the human person, and the inalienable rights that flow from that, if peace is ever to be possible.
