## JOY TO THE WORLD

Through the four weeks of Advent, we prepared ourselves by prayers, reflection on the word of God, the sacraments especially the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the Holy Eucharist and charitable deeds, for the celebration of the first coming of Christ and his return in glory at the end of time. This underscores the importance of the birth of Christ, and Christmas as the celebration of our great faith in Jesus as our Saviour and the Light of the world.

The Nativity of the Lord is a turning point in human history. With the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, God makes perhaps the clearest statement ever about the dignity of the human person, created in his image (Gn 1:27). The mystery of the Incarnation is, therefore, a confirmation of God's unfathomable love, a love so wondrous that the Creator, the Word through whom all things were created in the beginning (see Jn 1:1-4), deigns to share the creaturely state of humans in all things except its sinfulness (see Heb 4:15). By becoming man, Christ elevates the human nature to a new grandeur. His incarnation brings divinity closer to humanity in an unimaginable manner, so much so that to see, touch, and interact with him is to see, touch, and interact with God (Jn 14:9,11; Heb 1:3). Conversely, it also uplifts humanity towards God, making us, by his grace, Godlike. It divinises man as St Athanasius (ca. 298-373) asserts, "God became man that man might become God." In other words, God is with us in Christ, that we might through him be with God.

The liturgy of Christmas unpacks the central truth and belief of the Christian people about the coming of God as man in Christ and the light, joy, peace, and hope that it brings to the whole world.

The infancy narratives by the evangelists Matthew (1-2) and Luke (Lk 1:26-56; 2:) highlight the circumstances of Christ's birth. Conceived by the Holy Spirit and birthed by a virgin mother, Jesus is the Son of God. The two evangelists also recount the impact of his birth from the outset not only on those closely associated with him, especially Mary and Joseph, but also on others especially outsiders.

Particularly, Luke pays close attention to his humble birth and background. A King born not in a palace but in a dingy manger, robed in swaddling clothes instead of royal purple, and heralded by the lowing of cattle and bleating of sheep instead of trumpets and horns. Godhead hid in a fragile child, by his humble birth and lowly state! However, his true identity is perceived by the eyes of faith as announced by the angels to the shepherd, "I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by the whole people. Today in the town of David a saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord." The darkness of the manger is shattered by the radiance of his presence. Beyond the obscurity of the manger, the shepherds are filled with awe and wonder as they make haste to Bethlehem where they see everything exactly as they were told by the angels. They bear witness about him before their departure, "glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen." Their curiosity is matched by their faith.

On this day of joy, the shepherds remind us to be open and responsive to God's word, to allow our heart, mind, and spirit be moved by the light of faith to explore more closely so that we may understand more deeply and experience more intently what God says to us. Like them, we are encouraged and challenged to allow the message and event of the incarnation to touch and transform us, to awaken in us holy curiosity and joyful hope, and to spur us on from our respective comfort zones to become true missionary disciples of Christ, eager to share with others near and far, through our words and actions, the news of great joy of our Saviour's birth among us.

May he who knows the hopes and fears of our hearts, come and stay with us this holy season and always, and may the joy of his Nativity spread through us to the farthest ends of the earth. Amen.  $\bigcirc$ *IAE*
