BLESSED ARE THE LITTLE ONES


God's preference for the nobodies of this world has received significant attention in Catholic Social Teachings (CST), where the phrase, *The Preferential Option for the Poor*, first used in 1968 in a letter to the members of the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) by their Superior General, Pedro Arrupe, has been domesticated not only in Catholic theological reflection but also in magisterial or official Church teaching on the subject (see *The Compendium of Catholic Social Doctrine* (CCSD), 2004, §§182-184).

In the first reading, the prophet Zephaniah (2:3,3:12-13) asserts that the humble and the lowly, those who seek refuge in the Name and Power of the Lord will receive divine blessing: "In your midst I will leave a humble and lowly people, and those who are left in Israel will seek refuge in the name of the Lord." This powerless yet holy Remnant "will be able to graze and rest with no one to disturb them." They contrast with perhaps many of the Christians in Corinth where, as Fr Henry Wansbrough OSB explains, "there were so many different levels of employment and wealth, financiers, dockers, tentmakers, administrators and many others in that town with its double port, its booming trade, its biennial games and supporting trades." Hence, Paul warns them in the second reading (1 Co 1:26-31) not to be puffed by their wealth, wisdom, or power because God is uninfluenced by any of such (see 1 Sm 16:7; cf. Acts 10:28, 34-35). If anything, God is familiar with choosing what is weak and foolish by human standards. He uses "those who are nothing at all to show up those who are everything." This is clearly as counter cultural as it is also counter intuitive. That is why Paul himself does not lay any claim to any of his worldly (cultural, religious, or educational) advantages, but considers them as rubbish "because of the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord" (Ph 3:4-8). Similarly, he insists that his message and preaching are not based on "the brilliance of oratory or wise argument." Instead, through weakness, fear, and great trembling, he seeks "to demonstrate the convincing power of Spirit, so that your faith should depend not on human wisdom but on the power of God" (1 Co 2:1-5 – Next Sunday's 2nd reading!).

In the Gospel (Mt 5:1-12a), the Beatitudes (Jesus' Sermon on the Mount) encapsulate this divine revolution. It idealises the lowly and little ones whose lives express the truth of the Gospel. God's preferential option for the eight sets of people who are called 'blessed' or 'happy' is not just a matter of compensation for any material, physical, social, or cultural depravation. These are declared blessed / happy because of their openness to embrace the truth of the Gospel. They remind us of the spiritual attitudes required for true and sustainable discipleship and Christian life. To be sure, the evangelist Matthew is not offering us an abnormal programme of happiness. Ultimately, the Beatitudes offer us a self-portrait of Jesus, not just for the purpose of idealising him but, more importantly, for our imitation. Each of the Beatitudes connects us to Jesus' life and mission. He is the poor in spirit who embraced completely the Father's will in all things (Lk 22:42); the meek and gentle in heart (Mt 11:29), consumed by his thirst for justice and righteousness (Jn 2:14-17); the perfectly pure (Hb 4:15), yet scandalously merciful to sinners (Jn 8:11); the innocent victim of persecution, falsely accused, abused, and unjustly condemned to death (Lk 23:1-24), yet he reconciled all to God, bringing peace by forgiving all (Lk 23:34).

No matter how gifted we may be, the efforts we make, or our achievements, we are all little ones before God, for we are and have nothing before and without him. Our true boast can only be in God without whom we are nothing. But we are also called to imitate God by being a people and community that is sensitive to the presence and needs of the little ones around us. We must come down from our high horses if we are to achieve this. May God help us all! ©*IAE*
