## SHARED PRAYER OF THE WEEK

Lent is a favourable time, a season of salvation (see 2 Co 6:2). It is a blessed and gracious season of conversion and return to the Lord, during which we are drawn closer to God in a special way, armed with the ancient disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Obedience and trust in God are integral to the path of conversion, repentance, reconciliation, and communion along which the Lord invites us to walk during this season of grace and mercy. Without trust and obedience, we cannot enter into, experience, or sustain any genuine relationship with God and, by extension, with others for the sake of God. This is highlighted by the invitation at the imposition of ashes on our heads to mark the start of Lent during the liturgy of Ash Wednesday as it enjoins us to *"repent and believe the Gospel."* Of course, *believing the Gospel* does not just consist of subscribing to *articles of faith* in the Scripture, Tradition, and Church Teaching. It involves a total submission of mind, intellect, and will to God.

In today's readings, the fall of Adam and Eve in the first reading (Gen 2:7-9;3:1-7) is juxtaposed with the faithfulness of Jesus in the Gospel (Mt 4:1-11). These, as St Paul emphasises in the second reading (Rm 5:12-19), have lasting impact on humanity.

Adam and Eve's sin consists first and foremost in lack of trust in God, which breeds envy, and then disobedience. These three elements are expressed in the dialogue between Eve and the serpent. She is persuaded by the tempter that eating from the forbidden tree at the middle of the garden rather than lead to death, would make their eyes open so that they *"will be like gods, knowing good and evil."* According to the Catechism, *"All subsequent sin would be disobedience toward God and lack of trust in his goodness"* (§397). Genesis uses figurative language to express the abuse of human freedom and its consequences for humanity. The ultimate meaning of the story of the first fall is *"revealed only in the light of the death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ"* (CCC, §388). Hence, the declaration by St Paul in the second reading, "Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall."

The final victory of Christ, the *Second Adam*, is prefigured in his triumph over the devil in the wilderness. Against the three temptations, Jesus establishes himself as a model disciple, the obedient servant of God who, unlike Adam and Eve in the first reading and the rebellious people of Israel (Is 30:9), remains faithful. His forty days and nights in the desert remind us of Israel's experience in the wilderness (see Dt 8:2-3). Like Israel Jesus is tempted by hunger (Ex 16:2-8), *"If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves,"* tempted to put God to the test (Ex 17:1-4; see Dt 6:16), *"If you are the Son of God' he said 'throw yourself down,"* and tempted to idolatry (Ex 32), *"I will give you all these…if you fall at my feet and worship me."* However, unlike Israel, he neither complains nor succumbs to temptation. Instead, relying on the Word of God in Deuteronomy (8:3, 6:16, and 6:13, respectively) he resists and dismisses the devil.

Jesus' triumph over the three temptations can also be seen as a firm rejection by Jesus of a false understanding of his messianic mission. His was certainly neither an economic (see Jn 6:15) nor political (Jn 18:36) messiahship and, therefore, could not be carried out by the false means suggested by the devil. His firm renunciation of the allure of power, fame (spectacle), and wealth is an example and encouragement as well as a challenge for us especially during this graceful season of Lent when we are invited to renew our commitment to the "campaign of Christian service ... as we take up battle against spiritual evils" (Collect of Ash Wednesday).

Nourished by God's Word may we like Jesus grow in our trust and obedience to the Father through the power of the Holy Spirit. ©IAE.
