God of our past, present and future, you created each one of us in your image and likeness, help us to recognise you in each person. As we pray for end to suffering caused by racism lead us this day to walk with one another, pray with one another and work together,		

so that we create a future based on justice and healing, where all can fulfil the hope you have for all peoples.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

LETTING OUR LIGHT SHINE

Light occupies an important place in the Christian life and mission. This is highlighted especially in the liturgy of Baptism. The neophytes (newly baptised) or, in the case of infants, the parents and godparents are given a lighted candle (lit from the Paschal Candle) by the minister with these or similar words: "Receive the light of Christ... this light is entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly. This child of yours has been enlightened by Christ and is to walk always as a child of the light." Christ to whom the baptised is configured as priest, prophet, and king, is indeed the true light that enlightens all people (Jn 1:9; see 8:12). By virtue of their baptism the Christian is, therefore, enjoined to radiate the light of Christ to people near and far. This is the key focus of today's first reading (Is 58:7-10) and the Gospel (Mt 5:113-16). Both remind us of the Christian vocation and mission of shining the light of Christ on others in witness to the world.

The prophet Isaiah addresses the people of Israel after their exile in Babylon. He admonishes them about true religious observances such as prayer and fasting. Responding to the people's complaint that their fasting was unrecognised by God, Isaiah identifies their disposition and attitude towards those around them, especially the poor and vulnerable (Is 58:3-5) as the hindrance. To be true and, therefore, pleasing to God, the prophet asserts that piety in its varied expressions must be rooted in and related to the love of both God and neighbour. "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?" (Is 58:6). Today's passage expands upon this vision and spells out its consequences: "Then will your light shine like the dawn and your wound be quickly healed over...Crv. and the Lord will answer; call, and he will say, 'I am here.'" True worship cannot be divorced from a genuine love and commitment to the service and defence of others especially the poor and vulnerable. By sharing gifts of our time, talent, resources and, indeed ourselves, we beam God's light on all and, consequently, help to confront the darkness of greed, injustice, and exploitation of others.

The same message of sharing the light is echoed in the Gospel passage, which follows directly from Jesus' instructions on discipleship in the Beatitudes which we reflected on last Sunday. He calls his disciples salt of the earth and light of the world because. Like the prophet Isaiah, so with him. Discipleship is not only about the right relationship with God but also the right relationship with others. Just as salt and light do not exist purely for themselves, but to give taste and light to others, respectively, discipleship is not a personal privilege or for vainglory; proximately, it is for the good of others and ultimately for the glory of God. This is achieved not merely by proclamation (preaching) but above all by life witness to the truth and values of the Gospel. A failure to witness would, therefore, render the Christian as useless as the tasteless salt that is worth nothing except being trod underfoot, or like a light that is covered under a tub while there is darkness and fear all around it. We require both humility and courage if we are to live and act truly as salt of the earth and light of the world. Humility helps us to recognise that we are not the source of the sweetness or brightness that we strive to radiate; as Paul says, we are only earthenware vessels carrying this treasure (see 2 Co 4:7). We must, therefore, remain constantly grafted to Him from whom our sufficiency comes (Jn 15:5; see 2 Co 3:5). Courage helps us to persevere amidst the changes and chances around us.

As we celebrate Racial Justice Sunday today, we are reminded of "the need to confront racism and pursue racial justice with renewed vigour." By striving to let the light of Christ shine through us to the world, we can help realise this year's theme, "All are included in the mission of Christ and His Church. Let us walk together, pray together and work together." May our light shine to God's glory. Amen! ©IAE
