THE CROSS LEADS TO GLORY

Lent is a time of renewal and transformation by a deepening of our relationship with God through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving or charitable deeds. When practiced sincerely, through these three ancient disciplines of Lent, the Holy Spirit liberates us from undue attachment to ourselves and to worldly things and pleasures and, as a result, enable us to know and experience the love of God as his beloved sons and daughters who truly reflect the divine glory in our thoughts, words, and actions. We can then live and act as disciples. Discipleship is a call to share in Christ's glory. But Christ was ultimately glorified through humiliation and suffering (Lk 24:26; Ph 2:8-9). The cross, therefore, remains the way to glorification for his disciples. This message is particularly impressed upon us during this graceful season of Lent, especially in the Gospel account of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain (Mt 17:1-9).

The importance of this episode is emphasised by its being told by all three synoptic Gospels (Mt 17:1-9, Mk 9:2-8, and Lk 9:28-36). It is also mentioned in John's Gospel (Jn 1:14), and in the second epistle of Peter (2 Pt 1:16-18). The background to the event sheds light on its significance. It is situated after Peter's declaration of Jesus' true identity as "the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Mt 16:16). Soon after, Jesus began to tell his disciples about his Passion - suffering, death, and resurrection (Mt 16:21). Understandably, this did not go down well with them. Peter was bold enough to challenge such anomaly (Mt 16:22). A suffering messiah was for them (and maybe sometimes for us still!) as contradictory as it was ludicrous (see 1 Co 1:23). That is why the passers-by mocked him at Calvary, saying: "If you are the son of God, come down from the cross" (Mt 27:40). Nonetheless, he insists that they could not be his followers without denying themselves and embracing the cross (Mt 16:24).

Six days after setting this challenging teaching and demand before them, he took his three close associates, Peter, James, and John, up a high mountain where he was transfigured in their presence, his glory was unveiled before them, Moses and Elijah appeared and talked with him and lastly, from the thick cloud that covered them, the Father's voice issued forth and bore witness to him as his beloved Son and bid them to listen to him. The appearance of Moses and Elijah is associated with the confirmation of the mission of Jesus as the fulfilment of the Law and prophets (Mt 5:17). These two great Old Testament figures also had special encounter and spoke with God on Mount Sinai or Horeb (see Ex 19:1-34:30 and 1 Kg 19:8-18).

The transfiguration is Jesus' response to the impact of the scandal of the cross on his disciples. Thus, the preface of the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord (6 August), which is used today, declares, "For after he had told the disciples of his coming Death, on the holy mountain he manifested to them his glory, to show, even by the testimony of the law and the prophets, that the Passion leads to the glory of the Resurrection." In this light, he prepares the disciples for the trials and suffering that they must endure in this life, by offering them a forestate of the heavenly blessings that they will inherit if they remain faithful to his call and persevere to the end.

This assurance is extended to all of us this Lent and always. We are invited to follow the Lord to the top of the high mountain by ridding ourselves of anything that may distract and/or hinder us from encountering him. Like the disciples, the most important thing for us is not holding on to the splendour and beauty of the changing world around us, but a genuine openness to the voice of the Father which invites us to listen to his Beloved Son and, like Abraham in the first reading (Gn 12:1-4), do as he bids us, trusting that whatever hardships we bear for the sake of the Good News, as Paul says in the second reading (2 Tm 1:8-10), will lead us to the glory of new life in Christ at Easter and beyond it.
