NEW LIFE IN CHRIST

Generally, the readings and prayers of the Mass during the last two weeks of Lent steer us towards the Paschal Mystery of our Lord's death and resurrection. This is illustrated in today's Gospel (Jn 11:1-45). The raising of Lazarus from death is the seventh sign given by Jesus in the fourth Gospel. It is also the most important sign because it directly foreshadows his own death and resurrection. For Jesus who raises Lazarus after four days in the tomb must himself die and rise again after three days (Mt 16:21; Mk 8:21; Lk 9:22).

Further, Jesus' humanity and divinity are powerfully displayed through this episode. As true man, Jesus knew, as St Paul exhorts, how to "rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep" (Rm 12:15). He was not only comfortable with joy and happiness. He was also deeply touched by human misery and, therefore, wept at the death of Lazarus. His closeness to Martha, Mary and Lazarus was as genuinely human as one could get. He was a friend indeed, sharing with them in good times (Lk 10:38) as well as in adversity. Yet, his commitment to the Father's will was his utmost priority. No human ties, not even to his earthly parents (Lk 2:49; cf. Mt 12:46-50), could detract from it. Thus, as John tells us, despite his love for the siblings, he did not abandon his duty for them; "he stayed two more days where he was" before going over to Judaea to see them. His divinity was wondrously manifested when he raised Lazarus to life. He brings this about in two stages. First, he asked that the stone be rolled off the tomb. We remember here the prophecy of Ezekiel in the first reading (Ez 37:12-14): "I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people." Then, he turned to the Father in supplication, trusting in his steadfastness. And finally, "he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!" Instantly, the dead Lazarus heard his voice and obeyed - and is brought back to life. This echoes Jesus' prophecy in John 5:25: "I tell you most solemnly, the hour will come – in fact, it is here already - when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and all who hear it will live." Preface of today's Mass sums it up very well: "For as true man he wept for Lazarus his friend and as eternal God raised him from the tomb." Similarly, it continues, "taking pity on the human race, he leads us by sacred mysteries to new life.

We are also inspired by Martha and Mary's encounter with Jesus. They do not pretend about their pain at their brother's death and their frustration or probably disappointment that Jesus seemed to have arrived a bit too late. They believed his presence would have prevented his death. Yet, their faith remains remarkable. For Martha, all hope was not lost because she believed God will grant whatever Jesus asks. She had faith in Jesus. As "the resurrection and the life," Jesus offers all who believe in him eternal life, which is "to know you, the one true God, and Jesus Christ whom he has sent" (Jn 17:3). Martha clearly echoes this in her confession of faith. The passage from death to life corresponds to the transition from unbelief to faith. Hence, Jesus' question to Martha, "Do you believe this?" to which she responds emphatically, "Yes Lord ... I believe you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world." In the tomb, Lazarus personifies the power of death, but raised from the tomb, he shows the power of faith. So, Jesus embodies the fulfilment of Ezekiel's prophecy, "And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people." Just as the death and raising of Lazarus forecasts Jesus' death and resurrection so is the latter the pledge of our ransom from death and possession of a new and eternal life. To nurture and grow this new life of grace, we are told in the second reading (Rm 8:8-11), to give up unspiritual things and be open to allow the Spirit of God to live in us. Lent can help us embrace the new life in Christ if we are ready to hear his voice in the dead zones of our life and obey him. @IAE.
