LEARNING FROM THE EMMAUS EXPERIENCE

"Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?" With these words, the two disciples on the way to Emmaus express their relief and excitement after they recognised the risen Lord at the breaking of the bread.

The setting is Easter Sunday. We cannot tell if the two otherwise unknown disciples were on a scheduled journey or fleeing Jerusalem for fear of the Jews. But their frustration and despair because of the crucifixion is obvious. Acknowledging this, they said to him, "Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free." Their disbelief of the women's story about the empty tomb and its confirmation by the apostles (Lk 24:1-12) is also evident. They were deeply troubled because "of him they saw nothing."

There are three key moments in the story. First, "Jesus himself came up and walked by their side," but they did not identify him. The evangelist Luke mentions that "something prevented them from recognising him," namely, their hesitant faith, for they were "So slow to believe the full message of the prophets." So, Jesus sets about to cure their doubt, by explaining the scriptures to them. Oddly, they still did not recognise him as he talked with them. His interaction was, nonetheless, comforting. Hence, they begged him to stay with them that evening. This first moment mysteriously prepared them for the second during which "their eyes were opened and they recognised him," while at table, when "he took the bread and said the blessing; then broke it and handed it to them." Finally, moved by their encounter, they "set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem" where they narrated their experience to the apostles and others. They were totally changed by the encounter to become witnesses.

Through this narrative, the evangelist Luke illustrates the significance of the Eucharist. In his account, the breaking of the bread is the climax of Jesus' earthly ministry at the Last Supper (Lk 22:19); it brings about and discloses his presence after the resurrection (Lk 24:35); and constitutes the heart of the young community that would form the nucleus of the early Church after his ascension and Pentecost (Acts 2:42). This is why Vatican II's Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, describes the Eucharist as "the source and summit of Christian life" (§11). The Emmaus story is, therefore, not just a narration of a past encounter. It testifies to the living presence of the risen Lord in the Eucharistic gathering of his Church. About this, Vatican II, teaches in its Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy: "Christ is always present to his church, especially during the liturgy ... He is present through the sacrifice of the Mass ... most fully under the eucharistic elements ... He is present through his word, in that he himself is speaking when scripture is read in church" (§7).

We are drawn at every Eucharistic celebration, first to the Table of the Word where we are nourished through the readings and the breaking of the word in the homily. The ministry of readers is not just important, it takes on a 'sacramental' character. For readers at Mass lend their voices to God to address us. So, preparation through study, reflection, and prayer is to be cultivated in view of participation at Mass, especially by those who exercise the ministry of proclaiming God's word in Church. The Emmaus experience reminds us that when we prepare well to listen and are attentive to God's word, our hearts will certainly be warmed by the breaking of the word. This, in turn, will help us to lift them up to Lord properly when we turn to the Table of the Eucharist, ready to recognise him at the breaking of the bread. Surely, to recognise him at the breaking of bread is beyond a mental or intellectual process. It entails striving to conform ourselves to his real presence spiritually by receiving him worthily in Holy Communion and practically by becoming the 'sacrament' (concrete expression) of his real presence to our brothers and sisters, to those who yearn for his comforting presence on their journey. ©IAE.
