FOLLOWING THE GOOD SHEPHERD

The fourth Sunday of Easter is called *Good Shepherd Sunday*. The name reflects the theme of the Gospel reading for the three liturgical years (A, B, and C), namely, on Jesus' self-portrait as the Good Shepherd in John chapter 10:1-10, 11-18, and 27-30, respectively.

Influenced by their pastoral context, it was traditional among ancient Near Eastern peoples to imagine a god, king, or other ruler as shepherd. Against this backdrop, the Hebrew scripture, that is, the Christian Old Testament (OT) extended this metaphor to Yahweh as the shepherd of his people. A classic example is reflected in today's responsorial psalm, where the psalmist confidently declares in Ps 22 (23), *"Yahweh is my shepherd."* Evidently, the OT refers to God as *"shepherd of Israel,"* the one *"who lead Joseph like a flock"* (Ps 80), and likewise its leaders. However, Yahweh remains ultimately the shepherd of his people since both shepherds and flock belong to him and are answerable to him (see Ez 34:1-10, 17-22).

The Gospels frequently describe Jesus' outreach to the people in terms of a shepherd's care for his sheep: He had compassion for the crowds who were like 'sheep without a shepherd,' he set about to teach them at great length after which he gave them enough to eat (Mk 6:34-44; see Mt 9:36;); sent the disciples out like 'sheep among wolves' (Mt 10:16; Lk 10:3); addressed them as 'little flock' to whom it had pleased the Father to bequeath the kingdom (Lk 12:32); used the parable of the lost sheep to stress God's care for all who might get lost (Mt 18:12-14) and, against the Pharisees and scribes, to explain God's preference for a single repentant sinner over a selfrighteous multitude (Lk 12:1-7); and finally, referred to his death with the prophecy of Zechariah 13:7, "I will strike the shepherd and the sheep will be scattered" (Mt 26:31; Mk 14:27; Jn 16:32). Applying this imagery to himself especially in the good shepherd discourse in John chapter 10, Jesus identifies himself as the fulfilment of God's promise through Ezekiel, of 1) being himself the shepherd of his flock (34:11-16) and particularly, 2) raising up over them one shepherd, his servant David, who "shall feed them and be their shepherd" (34:23).

In today's Gospel, Jesus compliments his pledge of provident care, concern, and protection over his flock with a firm expectation of their openness and readiness to hear his voice and follow his lead. Only those who are open to listen to his voice and follow him, can be his disciples. This has practical implications. As Peter puts it in the second reading (1 Pt 2:20-25), *"to die to our faults and live for holiness;"* this is what it means concretely to listen to him and *"to follow the way he took."* Jesus also emphasises the gate of the sheepfold. Its significance lies not only on the fact that it serves to distinguish between the true shepherd and the imposter or thief, but also because it gives the sheep access to good pasture. This is a powerful imagery. It reinforces Jesus' declaration in John 14:6, *"I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."* That is why he established the Church to perpetuate his presence and mission in the world.

As taught by Vatican II, "the Church is in Christ as a sacrament or instrumental sign of intimate union with God and of the unity of all humanity" (LG, §1). Hence, it constantly nourishes Christ's flock through the word of God and the sacraments. Through baptism, all Christ's faithful have a share in this mission, but ordained priests are particularly called and commissioned through the sacrament of Holy Orders, to act in the person of Christ the head (CCC §875), the Chief Shepherd, and in his name as shepherds of his flock. Like all Christ's faithful, they can only carry out this mandate effectively if they are united to Christ, attentive always to his voice, and devoted to following in his footsteps. And so, we are invited especially today, to pray for our priests and those in training to become priests. © IAE
