SALVATION THROUGH THE CROSS

We begin Holy Week today. It is the last week of Lent. The greatest week in the Liturgical Year since it marks the re-enactment of the Mystery of Redemption through the celebration of the events of the Paschal Mystery of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection, especially in the Sacred Triduum - Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday (Easter Vigil). Through these celebrations we are reminded, as the apostle Peter asserts, that our salvation "was not paid for in anything corruptible, neither in silver nor gold, but in the precious blood of a lamb without spot or stain, namely Christ." This is the supreme demonstration of God's love, that Christ laid down his life for us (Jn 15:13), despite our unworthiness (Rm 5:6-8). Saved by the Paschal Mystery, the Christian people are called not only to celebrate the Cross as a symbol of Christ's victory over sin and death, but also to embrace it as "the power of God and wisdom of God" (1 Co 1:24). Thus, the Passion of Christ is read twice this week, on Palm Sunday (today) and on Good Friday. Reflecting on the Lord's Passion is important for us as missionary disciples.

The voluntariness of Jesus: Suffering and death was not imposed on him; he willingly embraced it in total surrender to the Father's will, despite feeling its weight and pain like any other human being. He did not pretend about the sadness and great distress over him as he said to his disciples, "My soul is sorrowful to the point of death." And so, at Gethsemane, he prayed three times, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass me by." But each time he surrendered himself totally to the Father, "Nevertheless, let it be as you, not I, would have it." The self-surrender of Jesus was rooted in his trust in the Father's love; therein laid his radical confidence and security. He echoes the suffering servant of Yahweh in the first reading (Is 50:4-7), who willingly accepts all insults and ill-treatment as a docile disciple confident, however, that the Lord will come to his help and he "shall not be shamed." Similarly, St Paul in the second reading (Ph 2:6-11), correlates the selflessness of Christ as expressed by his absolute humility and self-emptying (kenosis in Greek) to the point of dying on the cross, with his eventual triumph: "But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names."

In contrast with Jesus who, though fatally sorrowful due to his imminent suffering and death, willingly embraced the Father's will, the disciples fearfully deserted him. According to Matthew's account, Judas Iscariot treacherously handed him over; the impetuous Peter, denied him three times before the cock crew, and with James and John slept off while he needed their companionship. What about others? Perhaps we should rather ask, 'What about me?' 'Where do I stand in relation to the passion?' 'Can I still identify myself with Jesus when it is not politically correct, economically viable, socially convenient to do so?' Thomas À Kempis (1379/80-1471), in his spiritual classic, The Imitation of Christ, captures it succinctly: "Jesus has many who love His Kingdom of Heaven, but few who will carry His Cross. He has many who desire comfort but few who desire suffering. He finds many to share His feasts, but few His fasting. Many want to rejoice with Him, but few will stay with Him. Many follow Jesus to the breaking of the bread, but few will drink the cup of His suffering" (Bk 2,11). Without a doubt, the passion remains a perennial litmus test of true discipleship. "Anyone," Jesus stresses, "who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me" (Mt 10:38; see 16:24).

The cross of Jesus is central to the Christian faith and mission. It reminds us of the price of our salvation. Since there is no salvation outside the cross, "there is no other way to life and to real inner peace except the way of the Cross and daily self-denial" (Bk 2,12). Hopefully, we will strive to translate our contemplation of Our Lord's Passion this Holy Week into a life of sacrificial love and service. ©IAE.
