CALLED TO COMMUNION AND MISSION

The 1985 Extraordinary Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in its Final Report described the understanding of the Church as communion, "as the central and fundamental idea" in the documents of Vatican II. The synod preferred to use 'communion' to sum up the council's teaching, especially on the nature and mission of the Church, because of its mysterious character, incorporating both divine and human elements. Properly understood, "fundamentally," as the synod emphasised, ecclesial communion is "a matter of communion with God through Jesus Christ, in the Holy Spirit" and is attained "in the Word of God and in the sacraments," especially baptism and the holy Eucharist. Consequently, it cannot be reduced to social organisations or structures, much as it essentially requires appropriate instruments for its concrete expression and proper functioning. Such structures must be inspired by and subject to the word of God for their proper functioning. The apostle Peter's appeal in the second reading (1 Pt 2:4-9) is relevant here, "set yourselves close to him [Christ] so that you too ... may be living stones making a spiritual house." In other words, any institution that is not rooted in and oriented towards communion with the Trinity would stifle the spirit and creativity required for it to operate effectively and at the service of evangelisation. This calls for ongoing discernment through listening, consultation, dialogue, reflection, and prayer.

The Apostles and their early followers typify this image, vision, and outlook of the Church in the first reading (Acts 6:1-7). The evangelist offers us an inspiring account of the evolution of organisational structure(s) in the early Church, in response to a concrete need: A complaint by the Hellenists against the Hebrews about discrimination against their widows in the distribution of temporal goods. In modern language, a cry for equity, fairness, recognition, and inclusion. In response, the Apostles called the whole community together and placed the matter before them, with a proposal that was approved by the whole community. "Seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom," were then elected and entrusted with the task of guaranteeing fair distribution of food, while the apostles concentrated on the ministry of prayer and preaching. The outcome was outstanding. Massive conversion. A clear sign of their effectiveness as evangelisers; it correlates with their communion with God and with one another. Like Jesus in the Gospel (Jn 14:1-12), their work is reliable evidence in this regard (see Mt 15:16-20).

A similar approach was taken on the issue of the admission of Gentiles, at the so-called Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15:1-29). A few centuries later, through the instrumentality of the emperor Constantine, the first ecumenical council was convoked in Nicaea (AD 325), at which far-reaching doctrinal and pastoral decisions were taken through intense consultations, debates, and reflection, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit. This became the template, subject to adaptations, for subsequent councils or synods in the Church, down to Vatican II (1962-1965) and since then, the various assemblies of the Synod of Bishops that have so far held in Rome including the ongoing 16th Ordinary General Assembly (2021-2024) on synodality. By their creativity and candour, the insipid community of disciples in today's first reading, did leave a permanent mark on the Church of all time not least in the structures that have evolved overtime, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Besides, it does indeed provide a constant stimulus, critique, and/or challenge to subsequent generations and particularly to the disciples of today in our response to the invitation and task of new evangelisation. Whatever our calling, whether ordained (bishops, priests, and deacons) or non-ordained (religious and laity), we are all reminded of our shared responsibility by virtue of our common baptism and specific callings and charisms in bringing the Good News of salvation to peoples near and far. ©IAE
