SHARED PRAYER OF THE WEEK

~ Pope Fr

Today, as pilgrims in search of hope, we cling to you, Risen Jesus. We turn our backs on death, and open our hearts to you, for you are Life itself. Amen.

WITNESSES OF HOPE

Hope is one of the three theological virtues; faith and charity (love), are the other two. They are called 'theological virtues' to distinguish them from 'human virtues.' According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), human virtues "are acquired by education, by deliberate acts and by a perseverance ever-renewed in repeated efforts" (§1810). However, the theological virtues are "infused by God into the souls of the faithful to make them capable of acting as his children and of meriting eternal life" and, therefore, are "the foundation of Christian moral activity" (§1813); they "relate directly to God" and "dispose Christians to live in a relationship with the Holy Trinity" (§1812). Consequently, faith, hope, and charity occupy an important place in the Christian life and calling, with love enjoying a primacy among them (see 1 Co 13:13).

Hope is closely connected with the ultimate goal of the Christian life and mission, that is, communion with God. The 'Penny Catechism' summarises it aptly: "God made me to know him, love him and serve him in this world, and to be happy with him for ever in the next." Indeed, to see God as he really is, the beatific vision (1 Jn 3:2), is the ultimate Christian yearning, and is sustained by hope in God's promise. By hope, as the Catechism teaches, "we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC §1817).

Rooted in faith in the Risen Lord, Christian hope is not just a gift, a grace, but also an invitation to witness. It inspires and spurs believers to live and act, guided by the Holy Spirit, in the service of the Kingdom. This is the task of evangelisation. And it is as relevant today as it was in the time of the apostles and their collaborators whose mission is narrated in the New Testament especially in Acts of the Apostles. We cannot but be touched positively by the account of the impressive outcome of the mission of Philip, one of the seven deacons commissioned by the Apostles in last Sunday's first reading (Acts 6:1-7). His proclamation of the Risen Christ in a Samaritan town in today's first reading (Acts 8:5-8,14-17), was accompanied by many healings. This resulted in "great rejoicing in that town," an expression of hope among the people, because through faith, they were brought into communion with Christ and were no longer, as Paul says, "without hope and without God in the world" (Eph 2:12).

Christian hope cannot be taken for granted, nor should it be hidden. It must be proclaimed and / or celebrated. This holds true both for individuals and for the Church as a community of Christ's missionary disciples. We are called to be witnesses to the hope which is founded on Christ Jesus and guaranteed by the love of God which has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit (see Rm 5:5), the Advocate, Paraclete promised by Jesus in the Gospel (Jn 14:15-21). Likewise, the apostle Peter in the second reading (1 Pe 3:15-18) asserts: "Reverence the Lord Christ in your hearts, and always have your answer ready for people who ask you the reason for the hope that you all have." With these words, the blessed apostle exhorts the early followers of Christ to bear witness to their faith in Christ and be an example to the pagan world about the new life that comes from their faith in his name and through baptism and anointing with the Holy Spirit. For the apostle, it was not enough for them to follow Christ by believing in him. They had to be ready to courageously engage "with courtesy and respect and with a clear conscience" a largely hostile world that was opposed to the spreading of the Good News. For Christian hope is not an excuse to flee from responsibility. To the contrary, it equips us, in the words of St Augustine, with its "two beautiful daughters," that is, "Anger at the way things are, and Courage to see that they do not remain as they are." So, as witnesses of hope, we are tasked with the renewal of the face of the earth. ©IAE
