THE AUTHENTIC TREASURE

The kingdom of God was the centre of Jesus' life and mission. In Mark 1:15, the evangelist situates the beginning of his public ministry with his proclaiming the kingdom and calling people to it through conversion: *"The time has come ... the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News"* (see Mt 3:2). The kingdom was not something external to Jesus. It was not only deeply imbedded in his words and actions (Mt 12:28), but also coextensive with him (Lk 17:21^b). He embodied and made the kingdom present. For it he gave up everything (cf. Jn 18:37), that is, to accomplish the Father's will by his incarnation and the paschal mystery of his suffering, death and resurrection (Jn 6:38; see Lk 22:42).

The kingdom is also the goal of discipleship. For, following Jesus entails imitating him in his words and actions, that is, having the same mind that was in him (Ph 2:5), walking in his footsteps (Mt 16:24; Lk 9:23) and doing the works that he did (Jn 14:12). Bearing in mind Paul's description of the kingdom as *"righteo*usness *and peace and joy brought by the Holy Spirit"* (Rm 14:17), it is obvious why the kingdom is the authentic treasure worthy of pursuit by his followers. This is underlined in today's Gospel (Mt 13:44-52) especially in the parables of the treasure hidden in the field and the priceless pearl.

At least five lessons are evident from these two parables. First, the treasure and the pearl were pure gifts; they were not placed there by the finders. This coincides with the nature of the kingdom as pure grace, a gift given by the Father to his 'little flock" at his pleasure (Lk 12:32). However, secondly, discovering them required effort by both; they laboured for it. Whereas the merchant clearly set out in search of fine pearls and must have conducted his search at the right places, the farmer appears to have chanced upon the treasure while working on his farm. Still, like the merchant, he worked hard to uncover this gift, though this 'unexpected' discovery came from his normal everyday labour. Similarly, the kingdom does not, generally, lend itself to extraordinary persons, positions, places, or circumstances. It is almost always present and active in the ordinariness and perhaps messiness of our daily life and pursuit. Thirdly, the excitement of the farmer and merchant at their invaluable finds. Fourthly, their wise decision on what to do; their ability to discern between what is valuable and what is not, like the fisherman in the third parable, who "collect the good [fish] in a basket and throw away those that are no use." The wisdom displayed by them here echoes Solomon's prayer in the first reading (1 Kg 3:5,7-12) for "a heart to understand how to discern between good and evil." Lastly, their diligence and prompt action; they went and sold everything to acquire their finds. For no one who encounters the Lord Jesus and is open to the Good News of the kingdom ever remains the same: Simon Peter and his fellow Galilean fishermen (Lk 5:11); Levi (Mt 9:9) and Zacchaeus (Lk 19:8) the tax collectors; Francis of Assisi. Paul caps it well when he says, "I believe that nothing can happen that will outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For him I have accepted the loss of everything, and I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ and be given a place in him" (Ph 3:7-8).

We cannot gain anything of value without giving up something. Conversely, we cannot give up anything for something we do not consider valuable. In effect, discernment is essential in discipleship. We are, therefore, invited and challenged by Jesus to see and welcome the kingdom as a treasure that is worth more than everything else that we now value in life: family, possessions, privileges, power, and comfort (Mt 10:37-39; Lk 14:26,33). Like the farmer and merchant in Jesus' parable, the kingdom of God will be worth everything we can ever think of sacrificing, or even more, if we see it as the authentic treasure. Remember the words of Jesus, *"For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also"* (Mt 6:21). ©*IAE*
