## THE JUSTICE OF GOD'S UNEXPECTED GOODNESS

Justice is an integral core of ethics. It is an important building block for any society. It means giving to each person "what is their due" (The Catechism of the Catholic Church, §1928), that is, giving to both roups and individuals what each deserves. However, the calculation f what each person deserves is generally debatable. Nonetheless, ollowing Aristotle (384-322 BC), many ethicists and political theorists end to accept the notion of proportional reciprocity as a fair basis for stimating each person's due. This means that what is due to each erson is determined by what they have, so to speak, contributed or one. Therefore, for Aristotle, 'equals should be treated equally and nequals, unequally.' In this way, though not identical with each ther, justice is closely connected to fairness, that is, the ability to udge without reference to one's feelings or interest and making udgements that are not overly general but are concretely suited to pecific cases / situations. Thus, being treated as one deserves is ommon to justice and fairness, since they both deal with reward.

his question features prominently in today's Gospel (Mt 20:1-16). he parable of landowner and the labourers he hired illustrates the onflict that can arise concerning determining what is just and/or fair. at daybreak, then the third, sixth, ninth and finally at the eleventh our, the landowner goes out to hire workers to work in his vineyard. Vith the first set of workers, he negotiates to pay one denarius. With ne second, there is a promise of a fair wage; and, apparently, with ne third and fourth group as well. However, no such promise is learly stated in relation to the fifth set and last comers who are imply told, "You go into my vineyard too." So far, the parable reveals omething of the concern of the landowner for the poor; he hires nem to give them a chance to engage themselves and earn a living. he problem arises at payment time. He pays each of them the same age, starting from the last comers to the first comers. Seeing how enerous he is at paying the last arrivals one denarius, the first omers certainly expect him to pay them more; after all, they did more ours. Can we honestly blame them for thinking this way? It does eem the landowner has failed the test of Aristotle's maxim about reating equals equally and unequals, unequally. Isaac the Syrian is n record for asking provocatively how God could be called just in ne light of today's Gospel passage (see Ascetical Homilies, 51). Vhile this may, on the face value, seem true, a closer review of the assage, reveals otherwise. The requirement of justice is clearly ulfilled by the landowner. After all, he kept his "agreement with the vorkers for one denarius a day." God's fairness is not just manifested h his reward to the workers after their work. It is, above all, emonstrated from the onset in the opportunity he gives each of nem, especially by calling them even up to the last hour.

he parable is ultimately about the last judgement. So, it reminds us f God's unfathomable goodness. He does not give up easily or at all n any one of us. For it is his will, as Paul says, "that be saved and ome to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tm 2:3-4). His unexpected oodness transcends and upends human reckoning. It epitomises ne words of Isaiah in the first reading (Is 55:6-9): "Yes, the heavens re as high above earth as my ways are above your ways, my houghts above your thoughts." The truth is that God rewards us ccording to an unexpected goodness, not purely on what we eserve. As the psalmist says in Ps 129 (130), "If you, O Lord, should nark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?" Also, Paul asserts, "But when the kindness and love of God our Saviour appeared, he saved s, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his nercy" (Ti 3:4-5a; see Eph 2:4-5). Without prejudice to its relevance see Mt 25:31-46), there is no necessary proportion between human ork and divine reward. This, then, puts paid to any entitlement and resumption and calls us to trust in God's grace and mercy. CIAE
