Give us, good Lord, the grace to work for the things we pray for. Amen. (St Thomas More)

## PUTTING GOD FIRST

*"I die the king's good servant, but God's first."* These famous words were spoken by St Thomas More (1478-1535) to the crowds before his execution at Tower Hill on 6 July 1535. With them, More expressed his conviction about the supreme prerogative of God and the truth over any earthly power, primordial interest, or privilege. Thus, like his contemporary, St John Fisher with whom he shares his feast day (22 July), he chose death over betraying his faith by rejecting Henry VIII's claim as the head of the Church in England. His choice reminds us of the central message in Jesus' encounter with the Pharisees and Herodians in today's Gospel (Mt 22:15-21), that is, concerning our ultimate loyalty, priority, or preoccupation as missionary disciples of Christ. He typifies the singlemindedness echoed by Jesus in the admonition, *"give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God."* 

The significance of the Gospel passage is underscored by the fact that it is also mentioned by Mark (12:13-17) and Luke (20:20-26). Among other salient points, the ulterior motive of Jesus' interrogators is clearly highlighted by the evangelist. They came to trap him. They attempted to put him into a dilemma, hoping to catch him out either way – discredit him before the people or, more importantly, set him up against the imperial authority – by asking: *"Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?"* Ordinarily, his questioners were sharply divided on this matter among others. The Pharisees objected to the Roman hegemony and the paying of taxes to the emperor (Tiberius Caesar) as an infringement on the prerogative of God. Conversely, as supporters of Herod and his family, the Herodians cooperated with the foreign occupiers and the payment of taxes to Caesar. Strangely, however, both parties saw Jesus as a common enemy and, as a result, were united in their common desire to eliminate him.

Vintage Jesus! He saw through the deception in their initial flattery about his honesty, impartiality, and commitment to the truth (see Mt 19:16-17; cf. Mk 1:24-25). He exposed their insincerity when he asked for the money with which the tax is paid, and they handed him a denarius with the emperor's image and the blasphemous inscription, "Caesar Augustus Tiberius, son of the Divine Augustus," on one side and "Pontifex Maximus [High Priest]" on the other. Apparently, they were comfortable using the pagan imperial coin. Moreover, they did not seem to bother about carrying it on them into the sacred space of the temple where this encounter took place. Blinded by hatred, all they cared about was to ensnare Jesus. But he completely routed them with his answer. Did they give up? No! Like the devil in Luke's account of the temptation in the desert, they "left him, until the opportune moment" (Lk 4:13). Thus, they will accuse him falsely during the Passion before the Roman governor of Judaea, Pontus Pilate: "We found this man inciting our people to revolt. opposing payment of the tribute to Caesar..." (Lk 23:2).

Jesus did not just outwit his opponents. He seized the opportunity to offer them – and his disciples and us – the true interpretation of the Law and Prophets (Mt 5:17; see 12:1-14). Without opposing the paying of tax to Caesar, his insistence on giving to God what belongs to God, imposes a limit on such and, in fact, any civil obligations (see Rm 13:1-7; 1 Pe 2:17). Whereas submission to the state is relative, obedience to God is not only absolute but also the yardstick for the former. Indeed, Jesus' answer reiterates the *Schema: "Listen, Israel: Yahweh our God is the one, the only Yahweh. You must love Yahweh your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength"* (Dt 6:4-9). Absolute loyalty! This is what belongs to God that must always be given to him. So, Jesus' words cannot be stretched into an excuse for compromising our faith, the truth of the Gospel, or the moral obligations that flow from them. Like St Thomas More, we are reminded that allegiance to God ranks above all others. ©*IAE*.
