### SHARED PRAYER OF THE WEEK

#### PRAYER FOR SERENITY

O God and Heavenly Father, grant to us the serenity of mind to accept that which cannot be changed, courage to change that which can be changed, and wisdom to know the one from the other, through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen. **BE READY AT ALL TIMES!** 

We are gradually coming to the end of the liturgical year. Characteristically, the readings focus our attention on the end of the world and the coming of God's Kingdom, thereby, anticipating the season of Advent and the preparation for the celebration of the first coming of Christ in view of his second coming at the Parousia, the end of time. Liturgically, we are at a period of waiting and anticipation.

Far from a time of laziness or sloth, waiting to welcome the Lord requires active and committed preparation. This, in turn, requires wisdom. For Christians, wisdom goes beyond Thomas Jefferson's (1743-1826) description of it as "knowing what to do next," nor mere cleverness or intelligence. It is, over and above these, one and the first of *"the seven gifts of the Holy Spirt"* which, as explained by the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (§1831), *"complete and perfect the virtues of those who receive them."* 

The first reading (Wis 6:12-16) sheds light on the nature and relevance of wisdom in the believer's life. It reminds us that though priceless, wisdom is readily accessible to those who love, desire, and seek her: *"By those who love her she is readily seen, and found by those who look for her. Quick to anticipate those who desire her, she makes herself known to them."* Notably, she does not force herself on anyone and, therefore, risk being ignored or rejected. Yet, there are consequences for either choosing or rejecting her. This fact is stressed in the Gospel (Mt 25:1-13)

The parable of the ten virgins who went to welcome the bridegroom highlight the importance of wisdom in the life of the disciple. The impact of wisdom is evident in their attitude towards their mission. Whereas the wise five took extra flasks of oil with their lamps, the foolish ones took only their lamps. They must have thought to themselves, how foolish their colleagues were, bothering themselves with extra flasks of oil. After all, travelling light should normally be a sensible and smart choice. Well, if only one has everything one needs at one's destination!

The wisdom of the five wise virgins lay in their doing what was expected of them, that is, by preparing well, and making the sacrifice to be ready for the bridegroom's arrival. They also displayed wisdom when they refused to give their colleagues part of their oil, thus rightly distinguishing genuine charity from potentially risking their readiness for their bridegroom's arrival. On the contrary, the stupidity of the five foolish virgins consisted in their failure to do what was expected of them. Careless, assuming, and negligent, they failed to prepare adequately to welcome the bridegroom. Apparently, they took for aranted that he would come in time. Besides, even when he did not arrive timely, they failed to perceive the potential danger their shortage of oil might posed to their mission. Rather than finding where to refill their lamps, they joined others to sleep, apparently, presuming their colleagues would help if the need arose. Only to be shocked when the bridegroom arrived at midnight that the latter could not help them. Sadly, when they returned from filling their lamps, it was too late to join the bridegroom and the other guests at the feast.

Towards the conclusion of the Church's year, we are reminded not only of the end-times, but that we are pilgrims journeying towards our heavenly homeland. There, as Paul says in the second reading (1 Th 4:13-18), "we shall stay with the Lord for ever." The whole of earthly life is an opportunity to prepare for this life of eternal communion with God, which is our ultimate goal. And so, we are constantly called to be ready to welcome the Lord when he comes. That he will come, we know in faith, await with hope, and desire in love. About when, we do not know. But, like the five wise virgins, if we do what we have to do diligently, we have no reason to worry about the unexpected arrival of the Lord. Our watchword is: Always be ready! @IAE
