SHARED PRAYER OF THE WEEK		

O Lord our God,

you alone are the Most Holy King and Ruler of all nations. We pray to you, Lord, in the great expectation of receiving from you, O Divine King, mercy, peace, justice and all good things.

Protect, O Lord our King, our families and the land of our birth.

Guard us we pray Most Faithful One.

Protect us from our enemies and from your Just Judgment Forgive us, O Sovereign King, our sins against you.

Jesus, you are a King of Mercy. We have deserved your Just Judgment

Have mercy on us, Lord, and forgive us.

We trust in your Great Mercy.

O most awe-inspiring King, we bow before you and pray: May your Reign, your Kingdom, be recognized on earth. Amen. THE TRULY KINGLY PEOPLE

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe is celebrated on the last Sunday of the liturgical year. It was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 to counter the growing secularism and nationalism of the time. Initially observed on the last Sunday of October, it was moved by Pope Paul VI to the last Sunday of the Year in 1969 in his reform of the Roman Calendar after Vatican II. Among others, its current setting clearly emphasises its relevance for Christian hope (*eschatology*). The last Sunday of the year highlights Christ as the goal of history who at the end of time would *"hand over the kingdom to God the Father"* (1 Co 15:24-28). It also ushers in the beginning of Advent during which the second coming of Christ (*the Parousia*) is anticipated by the Church in the light of the celebration of his first coming (*the Incarnation*) at Christmas.

These points are highlighted in the Presidential Prayers of today's Mass. Against a secularism that recognises neither the sovereignty of God nor our religious obligation to worship and serve God above all else, we pray in the Collect ('Opening Prayer'), for the whole creation to be set free to acknowledge God's majesty, and to worship and serve him. The Preface extols Christ, who, anointed by the Father with "the oil of gladness as eternal Priest and King of all creation," offered "himself on the altar of the Cross as a spotless sacrifice to bring us peace." The Prayer over the Offerings asserts that Christ's kingship on the altar of the Cross is re-enacted at the Eucharistic altar and concludes by pleading that Christ "himself may bestow on all nations the gifts of unity and peace." Because these gifts always look towards the heavenly Kingdom for their ultimate fulfilment, we pray in the Prayer after Communion that we may live there eternally by "glorying in the commands of Christ, the King of the universe. Hence, Christ's kingdom or reign is fittingly eulogised in the Preface as: "An eternal and universal kingdom; a kingdom of truth and life; a kingdom of holiness and grace; a kingdom of justice, love and peace." Evidently, no earthly kingdom, past and present, fits this ideal. Certainly, none will ever do!

We recall Jesus' declaration before Pilate, "*My kingdom is not of this world*" (Jn 18:36). Whereas "*among the gentiles the rulers lord it over them, and great men make their authority felt*" (Mt 20:25), Jesus is the Servant-King par excellence. He "*came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many*" (Matt 20:28; see Jn 13:1-17). He is the shepherd-king who lays down his life for his flock (Jn 10:10-12), the perfect realisation of the prophecy of Ezekiel in the first reading (Ez 34:11-16): "*I myself will pasture my sheep, I myself will show them where to rest… I shall be a true shepherd to them.*"

Through holy baptism, the Christian people are formed into a royal people. Christian nobility/royalty consists in the privilege of sharing in Christ's life and mission as his holy priestly, prophetic and kingly people. Surely, it is not just enough to celebrate this honour. We must also strive to express it in our relationship to God and others. Like he was born at his first coming not in regal comfort but in the obscurity of a humble manger, "wrapped in swaddling clothes" (Lk 2:12), and made his 'triumphal entry' into Jerusalem on a donkey, a lowly beast (Lk 19:28-40; Jn 12:12-19), we are reminded in the Gospel (Mt 25:31-46) that Christ, the King of the Universe comes to us today disguised in the poor and vulnerable – the hungry, naked, thirsty, stranger, sick, and imprisoned. These are the faces and broken bodies of the suffering-servant king, which constantly appeal for our attention and action. How we respond to them will define our fate at the end of time. Thus, we cannot attain our final goal as a kingly people without recognising and reaching out to Him who tells us clearly: "I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink... I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me." @IAE
