And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord. Amen

WE SAW HIS STAR AND CAME TO DO HIM HOMAGE

On the solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord we celebrate the manifestation, the appearance, the unveiling of the identity and mission of the infant Jesus to the Gentiles.

07 JANUARY 2024

The Magi (three wise men or kings) were the first non-Jews to encounter Jesus. They represent the openness of the Gentiles to the Good News. The evangelist Matthew highlights this in his account of their epochal visit in the Gospel (Mt 2:1-12), when they describe their mission clearly to the people of Jerusalem, "We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage." This statement shows that they were not motivated merely by the curiosity to see "the infant king of the Jews."

From the onset, they were well prepared to receive him, as their symbolic gestures and gifts demonstrate: "they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh." Their outreach reminds us of the prophecy of Isaiah after the exile in the Babylon, in the first reading (Is 60:1-6): "the riches of the sea will flow to you, the wealth of the nations come to you... everyone in Sheba will come, bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord." Against this background, the Magi exemplify the fulfilment of the inclusive character of the messianic vision charted by the prophet Isaiah. Despite the gloom and difficulties after the return from exile in Babylon, the prophet announces a message of hope, characterised by light and glory, for the people of Israel and all nations: "Above you the Lord now rises and above you his glory appears. The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness." In the light of this prophecy, the Magi, by their action, recognise that the mission of Jesus is not only for the people of Israel, but for the Gentiles as well – indeed, for the whole humanity. This is also expressed by the Apostle Paul in the second reading (Ep 3:2-3,5-6). Commenting on the consequences of the universal relevance of God's revelation in Christ, the apostle explains: "it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Jesus Christ, through the gospel."

Today we recall the example of the Magi. Drawn by the star, they journeyed from distant lands in search of the infant King of the Jews. On finding him, they worshiped him and offered their most precious gifts to him. Though they were wise men, they needed to be directed every step of the way. They relied heavily on the guidance of the star, which led them to their destination, to "the place where the child was and filled them with delight." The star reminds us of the teaching of Vatican II in its Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, Dei Verbum, §6, that "God, the beginning and end of all things, can be known with certainty from created reality by the light of human reason (see Rom. 1:20)." Yet, as the Council also asserts, "it is through His revelation that those religious truths which are by their nature accessible to human reason can be known by all men with ease, with solid certitude and with no trace of error, even in this present state of the human race." This is demonstrated in the visit of the Magi. The star led to the place where the child laid. At that moment, its purpose ended. Their encounter with Jesus, the true light which enlightens all people (Jn 1:9), illumined their hearts (the eyes of faith) to recognise him, and moved them to worship him.

As we mark the Lord's Epiphany, we are invited to be open to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit which guides us on our life's journey as missionary disciples of Christ. Like the Magi, we recall that it is only through the light of faith that we will be able to recognise the presence and action of Christ in persons, places, or circumstances that we may, naturally, not anticipate. Finally, like them, we are called to offer our finest gift, ourselves, to him in spirit and in truth. © IAE

RECEPTION FOR OUR NEW DEACON ANTHONY SIMON

Our seminarian, Anthony Simon, who was ordained a deacon for the Syro-Malabar eparchy of Great Britain on 9 December 2023, will be received after the 11am Mass on 7 January. All are warmly invited to the reception in the Church Hall after the Mass.

NEXT WEEKEND: WHITE FLOWER APPEAL

A second collection will be taken next weekend to support the White Flower Appeal, which is an annual appeal by the Society for the Protection of Unborn Children (SPUC).

SPUC's vision is for a world where abortion is unthinkable. This year's appeal calls for the Government to end the pills-by-post DIY abortion.

As well as ending the lives of previous babies, this policy lacks safeguards against illegal late-term abortions, and puts mothers at physical and psychological risk. 86% of GPs are concerned that this scheme leaves women vulnerable to coerced abortion. Please be generous as you can to help SPUC defend unborn babies and their mothers by highlighting this urgent crisis.
