An Inoffensive Gospel is No Gospel

The Gospel can be offensive to every society and every period of human life for it makes people uncomfortable by saying things they do not want to hear or see but that is indispensable. However, an inoffensive Gospel is no Gospel because it lacks challenges that lead to new life. In our Gospel reading, Jesus is aware that the disciples were complaining about his teachings, for they were a stumbling block to their interests and their way of life. For instance, the Gospel sees human accomplishments as nothing and focuses on God. This can be offensive to our sense of pride and ambitions, especially, in our world, where individual enterprise and self-sufficiency are considered as prized qualities and celebrated. It is offensive to think that we are not in control of our destinies, for we want to be in control always and we walk away from God when we seem not to be in control. Again, the Gospel message of the Cross; that without the Cross there is no glory, is a very offensive message in our world. Indeed, the Cross is loved by all but only when it is worn as a medal or hung on our wall, however, when the Cross involves sacrifices, patience, giving up and relying on God, the cross becomes an offensive message. Nevertheless, the cross reminds us that we cannot do life alone without God, or we will crash. Indeed, the focus of everything that Jesus is saying is that it is not by our power, might, ability or knowledge, we must rely on God and hand our life over to him in order to have eternal life. Without surrendering and submitting to God, everything that we do is nothing and in vain. Think deeply of this and learn how to give your ego and sense of self the backseat of your car. TODAY'S READINGS

Entrance Antiphon Cf. Ps 85: 1-3

Turn your ear, O Lord, and answer me; save the servant who trusts in you, my God. Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long.

Penitential Act: I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do, (*And*, *striking their breast, they say:*) through my fault, through my most grievous fault; therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God. **Amen.**

The Gloria: Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. First reading Joshua 24:1-2,15-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people, 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.' The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods!

Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed? What is more, the Lord drove all those peoples out before us, as well as the Amorites who used to live in this country. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

Responsorial Psalm 33(34):2-3,16-23 *Taste and see that the Lord is good.*

I will bless the Lord at all times, his praise always on my lips; in the Lord my soul shall make its boast. The humble shall hear and be glad.

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

The Lord turns his face against the wicked to destroy their remembrance from the earth. The Lord turns his eyes to the just and his ears to their appeal.

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

They call and the Lord hears and rescues them in all their distress. The Lord is close to the broken-hearted; those whose spirit is crushed he will save.

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

Many are the trials of the just man

but from them all the Lord will rescue him. He will keep guard over all his bones, not one of his bones shall be broken.

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

Evil brings death to the wicked; those who hate the good are doomed. The Lord ransoms the souls of his servants. Those who hide in him shall not be condemned. *Taste and see that the Lord is good.*

Second reading Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must

love their wives as they love their own bodies; for man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Gospel Acclamation cf.Jn6:63,68 Alleluia, alleluia! Your words are spirit, Lord, and they are life; you have the message of eternal life. Alleluia!

John 6:60-69 Gospel

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before? 'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life. 'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him. Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.' **Priest:**
